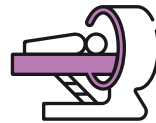

REVOLUTIONIZING ORTHOPAEDIC SURGERY

THE QEII IS HOME TO ATLANTIC CANADA'S FIRST — AND CANADA'S SECOND — ORTHOPAEDIC ROBOT

CAMPAIGN COMPLETED FOR THE ORTHOPAEDIC ROBOT AND AFFILIATED RESEARCH

QEII Foundation donors were the catalysts to bring the Mako SmartRobotics system to the QEII. A game-changer for orthopaedics in Nova Scotia, personalized care is at the forefront of surgical robotics. This technology allows surgeons to replace a joint that is tailored to the patient, by adapting the surgical plan based on their unique features. Meaning minimally-invasive surgeries with less pain, bleeding, quicker recovery time, and shorter hospital stays for patients.



I can see knees and hips in ways I've never seen before. The robot is the vehicle that's going to transition us into the new world of patient-specific surgery. We are grateful to the donors who have supported orthopaedic surgical robotics.

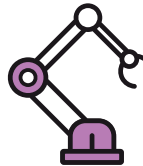

Affiliated research is also driving innovation in orthopaedics. Data collected from each surgery helps experts from the QEII, Nova Scotia Health, and Dalhousie University study the efficacy of robotics in knee and hip surgeries. This data is crucial to understanding each patient's needs, improving patient outcomes, and tailoring the surgical approach for more personalized care.



2,000 donors helped bring the Mako SmartRobotics system to the QEII.



The ortho robot is one of four surgical robots at the QEII; three of which are donor-funded.



Access to leading-edge technology like the ortho robot helps with recruitment and retention of top medical talent.

Bringing the Mako SmartRobotics system to the QEII is a prime example of our \$100-million We Are campaign at work and the role philanthropy plays in elevating health care to new heights.

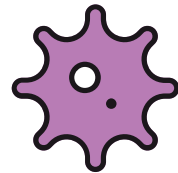

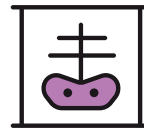

In 2022, bursary recipients represented 12 post-secondary institutions and technical schools across Nova Scotia.



Students from 40 different healthcare programs such as nursing, dentistry, and medical laboratory technology received bursaries.



The bursary creates opportunities for single parents, mature students, newcomers, and others who face barriers due to historical cultural and racial biases.

A FAMILY'S MISSION TO TRANSFORM INHERITED HEART DISEASE RESEARCH IN HONOUR OF THEIR SON AND BROTHER

The 17th hole, honouring the late Jordan Boyd, at the *Jordan Boyd Celebrity Golf Challenge (JBCGC) – The Final Round powered by CIBC*. While the Boyd family officially retired the *JBCGC* and *Jordan Boyd Celebrity Hockey Challenge (JBCHC)* community events in 2022 following the annual *JBCGC*, the far-reaching impact established in Jordan's memory lives on and will continue to grow with the family's leadership.

East Coast pride and impact is the rallying cry behind both events. In 2022, the *JBCGC* and *BMO Ride for Cancer* had their most successful years to date — smashing fundraising goals and creating unforgettable event-day experiences for participants, volunteers, sponsors, and more.

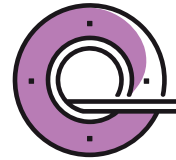

In 2013, while attending a hockey training camp, 16-year-old Jordan's life came to an end after he collapsed on the ice. It was later determined that Jordan had an undiagnosed, inherited heart condition called Arrhythmogenic Right Ventricular Cardiomyopathy (ARVC).

Ever since, Jordan's family has made it their personal mission to help prevent sudden death from cardiac arrest, which includes fueling vital heart health research at the QEII's Inherited Heart Disease Clinic.



Over \$1.2 million net raised for the QEII's Inherited Heart Disease Clinic via the *JBCGC* and *JBCHC* events since 2014.



The 2022 *BMO Ride for Cancer* event raised \$2.1 million net, including a \$500,000 match, for cancer-fighting technology at the QEII.



Over 1,600 *BMO Ride* and *JBCGC* participants in 2022, raising critical funds for cancer care and heart health.

Thanks to the Boyd family's incredible fundraising efforts, Jordan's name has become synonymous with impact — not just within the tight-knit Bedford community where he was raised but every patient and family who will benefit from the life-saving research funded.

THE QEII PATIENT ASSISTANCE FUND HELPS PATIENTS FOCUS ON

Rachel Millet, a social worker at the QEII, regularly sees what can happen when a personal health crisis is compounded by financial difficulties — patients are more concerned about their finances than about their illness. The QEII Patient Assistance Fund is a critical support she can offer patients.

Illness or injury interrupts daily life, meaning a loss of income, increased travel to medical appointments, and strain on patients and their families. With the rising cost of living, the need is amplified. The QEII Patient Assistance Fund was created to help patients pay for necessities of daily life that can create financial burdens during an illness or amenities and services like rent, mortgage, lodging, home utilities, transportation costs, medication, and more.

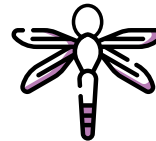
As the QEII is the most specialized health centre for our region, memorial giving is making a meaningful difference in the lives of many.

That experience directly inspired the family's recent gift of stock in support of Activating Cancer Communities through an Exercise Strategy for Survivors (ACCESS), a free exercise program to help patients better cope with their treatments and enhance their overall health and well-being.
