QEI COVID-19 RECOVERY

TACKLING WAIT TIMES AND REDUCING BACKLOGS
FOR PATIENTS

IMPACT

\$1.2 MILLION COMMITTED FOR MORE APPOINTMENT TIMES AND INCREASED ACCESS

The COVID-19 pandemic caused delays for patients waiting for diagnostic scans but QEII Foundation donors are helping the QEII get back on track. From the donor-funded QEII COVID-19 Response Fund, additional technologists, sonographers, and appointment booking staff were hired to extend the hours of operation of CT-scan, ultrasound, and MRI services.



The COVID-19 Recovery strategy and supporting funding is helping us deal with a major issue. Timely access to diagnostic imaging is critical for providing the best care to patients.

A total of 28,000 CT, ultrasound and MRI appointments were cancelled in the months after COVID-19 hit the province. Although urgent and semi-urgent appointments – including cancer care – were not cancelled, the wait times for scheduled scans increased. Donor support allowed appointments to be opened up to patients on weekends and until 11 p.m. on weeknights, with as many as 275 patients a week now receiving their diagnostic scans.



The current backlog of outpatients waiting for diagnostic imaging will be cleared and changes will be made to meet the 60-day standard of providing elective CT and ultrasound services to patients.

TO ALLEVIATE PATIENTS'
FINANCIAL STRESSORS

A life-changing diagnosis or sudden healthcare experience can knock anyone off their feet. Sometimes patients are more concerned about the financial burden of being sick than they are about their illness. The QEII Patient Essentials Fund – a first-of-its-kind pilot program developed by the QEII Foundation – is helping ease the financial burden by providing gift cards to patients for urgent, essential needs during their care journey.



Our patients come from all over Atlantic Canada and can have long, stressful hospital stays. It's easy to forget that along with the physical and mental burden of being in hospital, patients can have financial burden too. Being able to do something about that felt great, a little light at the end of their tunnel.

Some treatments can require patients to eat a specific, specialized diet that is beyond the regular grocery budget. Or personal care products are needed to treat the side effects of medicines. And often, patients are coming to the hospital for multiple treatments, over several weeks, requiring a lot of fuel for travel. When facing serious illness or injury, money should be the last thing on our minds.



Equipping the healthcare teams with essential gift cards allows them to make on the spot, immediate decisions for the patients who need them most. A simple gesture can go a long way.

TRANSFORMING SURGICAL CARE

\$4 MILLION RAISED FOR HYBRID OR

More than 200 donors came together to fund \$4 million-worth of best-in-class technology within the QEII's new Stewart E. Allen Hybrid OR. One of the most technologically advanced operating suites available today, it allows QEII surgical teams to perform diagnostic imaging, minimally-invasive procedures, and complex, open surgeries all in the same room, at the same time. By eliminating the physical divide between the OR and real-time imaging, patients will no longer need to be transferred to different floors for their imaging needs.

Medicine and the East Coast have long held a place in his heart – ultimately inspiring his support.

On the road and trail, more than 1,200 Riders united – safely apart – for parents, spouses, friends, and loved ones. Since 2015, our unstoppable Ride community has raised \$5.9 million net to transform cancer care. All for our mission to continue to build a QEII centre of excellence in cancer care, equipping our healthcare teams with the most advanced technology available to help conquer this devastating disease.

Cancer is a disease that's deeply rooted in our genes. And with more than 200 different types of cancer, no two tumours or diagnoses are alike. BMO Ride for Cancer led the charge to introduce new genetic sequencing technology to the QEII to analyze the genes of tumour samples. This will help identify the most targeted and effective treatments for cancer patients based on their tumour's genetic makeup and unique cancer type.



Better outcomes, fewer side effects, access to a new therapy or clinical trial are all benefits this technology brings to patients. Knowing how a cancer might progress and the treatment it may best respond to, will save lives.

SEEING THE INFORMATION TO COMBAT DISEASE

DEDICATED RETINA RESEARCH TO DETECT, INVESTIGATE,
AND IMPROVE CARE FOR PATIENTS

Dr. Corey Smith, assistant professor at Dalhousie University and affiliate scientist at Nova Scotia Health, is the first QEII Foundation Scholar in Retina Research. He is focused on understanding the diseases that impact so many.

Dr. Smith's work, which is supported by a \$1.5-million endowment, is just one example of how donors are investing in research to change the future of disease and care. Like Research Chairs, endowments allow funds to be available in perpetuity. From lab to bedside, and whether impact is immediate or has a longer horizon, research is key.



My interests and background are in medical imaging – so a big focus of my work will be diagnosis, better understanding these diseases, identifying new markers, and improving ways to image the eye.

The retina is the part of the eye that senses light and sends signals to the brain. While Dr. Smith's research will encompass retinal disease broadly, the two most common retinal diseases are age-related macular degeneration and diabetic retinopathy. Both, if left untreated, can lead to blindness.



The QEII Eye Care Centre is a specialized clinic, serving patients from across the Atlantic provinces. With more than 50,000 patient visits per year, the clinic helps many patients with a variety of diseases affecting the retina.

When Kawthar and Ebraheim Barho lost their seven children in a house fire in February 2019, the tragedy gripped the surrounding community. Three mothers from the Muslim community, in collaboration with the Ummah Masjid and Community Center, were inspired to start the group Barho Friends to honour the Barho family by fundraising to renovate a family room in the QEII's intermediate care unit (IMCU) – raising more than \$8,000 to transform the space.



The family room is now complete, revitalized by the much-needed renovation. The room has a refreshed feel and has several features to help families feel calmer during stressful and uncertain times with their loved ones in the IMCU.

Since 2018, these bursaries have supported 97 students on their learning journey. 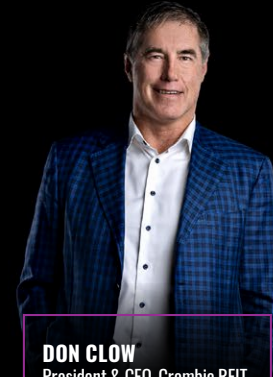

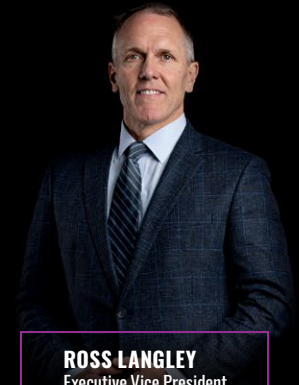

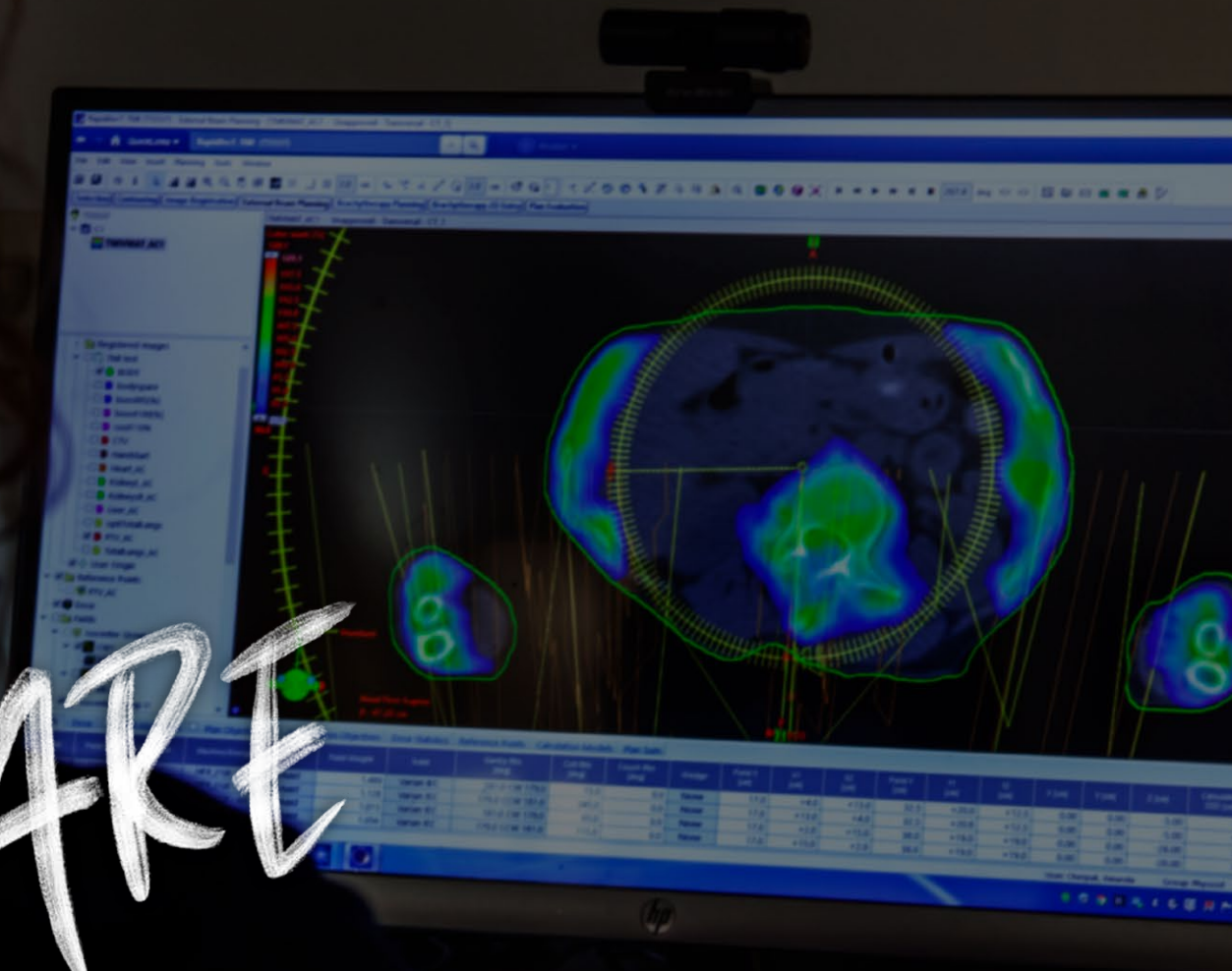
